#### **BACKGROUND** I

The Child Sponsorship Programme provides crucial financial sponsorships and social support to children living in abject poverty, ensuring all children have access to education and opportunities to improve their living conditions and lead self-sufficient and independent lives. The Programme connects vulnerable children and their families to people from around the world who want to be part of a rewarding journey to create lasting change in the lives of those most in need, by providing them with the means to access basic necessities

#### **BENEFICIARIES**

Children from severely disadvantaged backgrounds who are not enrolled in education or at high risk of dropping out due to financial hardship. Children who are orphans or street children; children from large families with parents with physical disabilities; children from low-income households; children whose families are living in extreme poverty. Children currently enrolled in the Child Sponsorship Programme who are over age 16 are considered for further support after high school if they are still experiencing extreme financial difficulty and want to pursue college or university level education or vocational training



## MONITORING AND EVALUATION

CNCF Social Workers conduct annual home visits to Child Sponsorship Programme children and their families to assess their living conditions, livelihood needs and challenges. Updates are also provided at sponsorship distribution days known as "Community Day". The social workers see most of the children each month at distribution days where the children and their families come to receive their sponsorship money. During distribution days, the social workers speak with the children to assess their home life and progress at school and offer guidance and support. Reports on the progress and achievements, and problems of the sponsored child are sent to each sponsor along with a personal letter written by the child. Internal team weekly meetings are conducted for CSP staff to update and exchange information with one another and to discuss programme-related issues and solutions. A monthly report is completed by the CNCF Programme Manager and by Country Director an annual report is made available to all stakeholders

### **OUR YEAR**

In 2023, CNCF's Child Sponsorship Programme (CSP) remained steadfast in providing crucial financial and social support to children and their families living in extreme poverty. The monthly sponsorship covers the costs of education including tuition fees, school supplies, uniforms and transportation to and from school that families cannot afford. In addition to the monthly financial sponsorship, children and young adults are actively engaged in personal development activities aimed at fostering essential social and life skills. They are also provided with additional assistance to overcome challenges, ultimately empowering them to lead self-sufficient lives.

## 27,490 CHILDREN AND YOUNG ADULTS

have been supported with monthly financial sponsorship through the Child Sponsorship Programme in Mongolia to remain in school and further their education.



## From Adversity to Achievement: Turuu's Journey with CNCF

Turuu\* joined CNCF's Child Sponsorship Programme in 2014. Now 20 years old, he has graduated with a diploma in mechanical engineering from the Mongolian Japanese joint KOOSEN college. He lives with his grandmother, mother, and younger brother, without knowing his father. His grandmother is retired, and his mother is disabled, having lost her working capacity due to a severe spinal cord injury.

Since joining the Child Sponsorship Programme, Turuu has received regular health and psychological services through CNCF's Psychosocial and Healthcare Programme and has become a member of CNCF's Noble Volunteer Club. Through CNCF's multifaceted services, he has developed self-confidence, refined his communication skills, and cultivated a genuine desire to assist others. During his studies at KOOSEN, Turuu excelled academically and personally. Successfully passing a job interview and examination, Turuu secured an internship at Santo Company in Japan. This opportunity not only underscores his academic prowess but also his readiness to engage in the global workforce.

Turuu's ultimate aspiration is to leverage his education and experience to build a brighter future for himself and his family. He envisions a life where he can provide stability and happiness for his loved ones, breaking the cycle of financial hardship.

## A Life Transformed by the Child Sponsorship Programme

"My name is Zoloo and I am 13 years old. I first joined CNCF's Child Sponsorship Programme in 2016. I live with my mother and older sister, our father ran away when we were young and never came back. When I was small, we lived from family to family, because we did not have own ger (a Mongolian traditional home) to live in.

My mother was working as a gatekeeper for an apartment entrance, sometimes we stayed in the entrance at night. There was no way for my mother to leave us in an orphanage and we stayed there for 3 years. But I think that I was a very lucky girl because my life has completely transformed since being enrolled in CNCF's Child Sponsorship Programme. I am always grateful for the moment when I was told that I have a sponsor who will support me, and this news lit a light in my life. Also, I always remember and am grateful for the day we received the ger from CNCF and our living conditions improved so much, finally giving us a warm and beautiful home of our own. It also provided me with a great opportunity to study and be educated in my own safe, peaceful environment and live happily together with my sister and mother.

Every month since 2016, thanks to the generous sponsorship, I have received monthly money for my education and daily needs. Thank you to my sponsor in Ireland for their love, care, kind heart and commitment. If I had not met with CNCF and my kind sponsor, I would still be living a hard life and would not have gained confidence for my bright future ahead. I would like to express my deepest gratitude to the CNCF and my generous sponsor who is investing me so much in my education and whole life".
